Dear Parents and Carers

Industrial Action

As you may be aware, the NEU intend to take industrial action/strike on the following days:

- Thursday 27th April 2023
- Tuesday 2nd May 2023

The strike is happening because of a national dispute between the unions and the government over pay, and not because of any issues at our school.

I am writing to ensure you have sufficient notice of what this means for your child's education on the above dates. We are attempting to spread the impact of the strike action across the year groups, where possible.

The arrangements for Thursday 27th April 2023

- Primary provision is unaffected. All primary pupils will be expected to follow the normal times of the school day.
- Year 7, 10 and 11 pupils will attend school on Thursday 27th April.
- Year 10 and 11 pupils will remain in school until 3:15pm.
- Year 7 pupils will be released at 12:45pm.
- Year 8 and Year 9 will work from home using online resources provided.
- Pupils in **Year 8 and Year 9** who are entitled to <u>free school meals</u> will attend the school site between 1:15pm-1:30pm to pick up a hot or cold lunch.
- All pupils who access the <u>HIVE</u> will attend school on Thursday 27th April.

The arrangements for <u>Tuesday 2nd May 2023</u>

- Primary provision is unaffected. All primary pupils will be expected to follow the normal times of the school day.
- Year 7, 10 and 11 pupils will attend school on Tuesday 2nd May.
- Year 10 and 11 pupils will remain in school until 3:15pm.
- Year 7 pupils will be released at 12:45pm.
- Year 8 and Year 9 will work from home using online resources provided. Pupils in Year 8 and Year 9 who are entitled to <u>free school meals</u> will attend the school site between 1:15pm-1:30pm to pick up a hot or cold lunch.
- All pupils who access the <u>HIVE</u> will attend school on Tuesday 2nd May

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Pupils with an Education Health Care Plan (EHCP)

Pupils in any year group with an Education Health Care Plan (EHCP) have the opportunity to attend the site should they wish. Our SENCO, Ms Lloyd Trewick and Designated Safeguarding Lead, Mr Tobolkiewicz, and the safeguarding team will be present and contactable on site as usual, on both strike days.

Remote learning

We will set work for pupils in Year 8 and 9 on Thursday 27th April and Tuesday 2nd May on Microsoft TEAMs. Pupils also be directed to Moodle https://secondary.moodle.tgacademy.org.uk/login/index.php and the Oak Academy https://classroom.thenational.academy/subjects-by-key-stage. Whilst we have successfully delivered education in this scenario before, we cannot provide live, remote lessons because we will not have capacity for this provision based on anticipated disruption.

Further information

- There will be no extra-curricular classes offered on both days to reflect limited capacity
- Wrap-around care and breakfast clubs will continue
- If your child (Year 7) needs to stay in school and wait for siblings in primary, they should attend the school library.
