



Geography News

It has been a very exciting and productive term for geography at TGSA with a plethora of activities and investigations taking place.

Year 7 began the term by conducting a study across the whole of Africa. This ranged across the whole continent, from the impacts of the South African World Cup in 2010 all the way to the challenges faced by millions in the Horn of Africa. We then moved on to studying fantastic places across the world, focussing on a range of biomes from tropical rainforests to deserts. The students enjoyed engaging with the homework where they had to produce a fact file for the biome, including climate, location and adaptations. Look out for a new geography display coming very soon!

Year 8 have been looking at challenging cities, a very topical issue in today's constantly modernising world. We looked across the entire globe, covering issues at home in the UK, a floating squatter settlement in Lagos, Nigeria, to Copenhagen in Denmark. The students particularly enjoyed engaging with solutions to modern day challenges, hopefully they can be the agents of sustainable change moving forward! We have just begun a module on Glaciation, looking at how physical processes during the UK's Ice Age (20,000 years ago) have shaped the land around us today.

Year 9 Geography has been looking at our Blue Planet including anthropogenic impacts (thanks Mr Morton for our vital vocabulary). After embarking on an enquiry looking at the issue of plastic pollution in our oceans, year 9 felt empowered to try and make an impact. As a result, they have created some fantastic letters addressed to Mr Boris Johnson himself. Within the letters, students discussed the issue using scientific facts, offered solutions and expressed their point of view. We are immensely proud of the students work and cannot wait to send them to 10 Downing Street later this month! We shall keep the newsletter updated with our progress.

Year 10 are deep into their GCSE course at present. Within the past few months we have been looking at our hazardous planet. Students have been looking at the causes of earthquakes and volcanoes, which then allowed them to conduct a comparative case study analysis on the effects and responses of the New Zealand (2016) and Nepal (2015) earthquake. We then looked at tropical storms, using Typhoon Haiyan as our case study (2013). We have just begun a new topic that is very relevant in modern day society, Climate Change. The students are interested in this module and in particular the possible impacts of climate change in the near future. Keep a look out for letters coming home with students over the next few weeks! We have period 6 starting up for year 10 as year 11 is just around the corner and we also have an exciting opportunity for students to visit the UK coastline in Hunstanton.

Year 11 have been busy completing their mocks over the past few weeks. We are really proud at how hard they are working and know that they will continue to make themselves proud going forward. Within the classroom we have been revising previously taught topics as well as reinforcing key exam techniques to best prepare them for the exciting and challenging few months ahead. I'm sure you will all wish them luck with their upcoming exams over the next few months!



Spanish News

The Spanish department has had an exciting year so far! Year 7X have had an exceptional start to their Spanish studies, and are currently working on the topic of school. Ask any 7X-band student to name various subjects they study, and they could tell you over 10 in Spanish! Year 8X are working hard to communicate what they eat at different mealtimes, and their conjugation and application of three tenses has been outstanding. Year 9X have developed an awareness and ability to communicate about important social and global issues showing their tolerance and respect for different cultures. Year 10 have shown fantastic development and have been learning in more detail about the different festivals and traditions that take place in Spain. If you have the chance, ask a Year 10 Spanish student why they eat 12 grapes to ring in the new year in Spain! Year 11 have been working hard to achieve the best possible results they can, with a particular focus on their speaking. Wish them luck as after Easter they will be completing their speaking exams. Years 3-6 have also shown great enthusiasm to language learning, using Spanish in the

classrooms as well as in the corridors and

around school.

Outside lessons, a group of dedicated and enthusiastic students from years 7-9 have enjoyed watching films in Spanish during Club España (as well as some much deserved "palomitas"). We have just finished Jumanji and they will vote on what the next film will be after the Easter holidays. Finally, we are bringing Spain to Year 11 by visiting a Spanish restaurant in May where they will have the chance to try a variety of different tapas.
